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## HWSETA attends TARDI graduations in the Eastern Cape province

Graduations are always an exciting ceremony because they not only highlight the importance of how far hard work and dedication can get you, despite the challenges one faces along the way, but they also highlight an important picture of a bright future that lies ahead to the one that is wearing a graduation gown.

This is why the HWSETA was delighted to attend the graduation ceremony of 49 students that were funded by the HWSETA to study for a National Diploma in Animal Health in 2020.

This auspicious ceremony was held in the town of Mthatha in the Eastern Cape province, at the Tsolo Agriculture and Rural Development Institute (TARDI). Present was Dr Toyota Ndudane, the principal of TARDI, the TARDI staff members, the AGRISETA, and Nonkqubela Pieters, the MEC for Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development in the Eastern Cape.

Ms Pieters during her address to the graduates, went on to say that "This opportunity not only opens the door to enter into the workforce, but it also opens the door to create employment".

With Animal health being such a diverse and versatile field, especially in animal nutrition and animal health care, or to owning a farm if that is one's aspiration, these graduates have unlocked the doors to their full potential. Even though the journey was not easy, especially with Covid-19 disrupting their studies and not having the usual learning experience.

However, that did not stop the will of these graduates to persevere and reach their dreams. One graduate said "The biggest challenge that we had faced was Covid-19 because it disrupted the way that we study. But here at TARDI, there is no oneness. We rely on one another and are there for one another. Everything was supplied to us, we had food all the time and our tuition was covered. We are also fortunate that here at TARDI, as compared to other institutions, we did not face issues like tribalism and racism. Everyone is welcome here".

The HWSETA understands that there is still work to be done to transform the landscape, especially in areas such as animal health to ensure that the skills shortages are met and filled. Such endeavors make it possible that a difference will be made and lives will be changed for the better. We are proud to contribute positively.

Dear Valued HWSETA Stakeholders,

We have come to the end of our financial year, and what a year it has been! A year, where we have participated in World Skills South Africa, bringing the skill of Health and Social Care for the first time to compete in our country and taking this internationally. Due to the great success of this initiative, the HWSETA will once again support this skill and improve on its delivery this year. The applications are being centralised at World Skills SA, and all applications must be in by 20 April 2023. If you meet the criteria and have learners who can apply, please do so, you will not be disappointed.

Just looking back for a moment, please read about our AGM that we held in November last year. Thank you to all stakeholders who joined us, it was truly worthwhile being able to interact with you face-to-face.

In this edition, we also provide you with some helpful information relating to accredited qualifications, tips for tertiary education, protecting yourself from unscrupulous operators, and WSP/ATR submissions due the end of April 2023. We are holding workshops during April to assist our employers with this process.

Our lead awareness campaign this year around veterinary science and all the careers that are on offer, wrapped up with the Chairperson of our Board attending the Animal health Graduation at Tardi, where we celebrated the graduation of 49 students who completed an Animal Health Diploma.

Furthermore, the HWSETA is in 2023, funding 50 new students and 127 continuing students from TARDI for the Animal Health Diploma.

In other areas, we wanted to highlight the HWSETA's support for SMMEs and our Levy exempt sector. The story about Portia is just one of our success stories where we funded a SMME and where this funding translates to real hope. What we have seen from our funding of levy exempt, SMME as well as cooperatives, is that these entities have perseverance and resilience, which allows for our funding to add to their journey to greater success.

The internship and TVET college work experience programme is a priority for the HWSETA, as well as the Department of Higher Education and Training

in all sectors. According to the Department of Higher Education and Training's 2018 TVET College Student Support and Development Report, the employment rate of TVET college students in South Africa is approximately 70%. However, it is important to note that this figure may vary depending on factors such as the field of study, location, and individual circumstances of the students.

In general, TVET graduates have a higher chance of finding employment compared to those who only have a general education. However, it is important to note that the quality of TVET education and the relevance of the skills taught can greatly affect the employment rate of graduates. There may be a mismatch between the skills taught in TVET colleges and the skills demanded by employers, which can lead to lower employment rates. TVET internships, work integrated learning and work experience can assist greatly to address the gap between the skill and the needs of the workplace, therefore allowing these students to have greater employability.

The HWSETA's artisan programme in several areas is strong and is producing impactful results. Please read about our former cleaner at the HWSETA who, with funding provided by the HWSETA, was able to take up the opportunity to become a diesel mechanic. She is now in full time employment as a diesel mechanic. This is but one of many such amazing success stories.

The HWSETA capitalises on all possible opportunities to support our sector. An example of this is the Phlebotomy learnerships awarded on Human Rights Day. This is a qualification in high demand with an extremely high employability rate. Our partners in this area continue to offer good quality training consistently, where graduates are well sought after.

Going back a bit.....we celebrated Valentine's Day by having a heart healthy breakfast where the Heart and Stroke Foundation spent the day with the HWSETA, talking to us about heart health awareness and then offering health services to test basics such as blood pressure, cholesterol BMI and sugar. As an Employer, the HWSETA is mindful of the mental and physical health of our employees, and we support our employees in numerous ways.

In celebrating Disability awareness month, the question arises on how we can do better and promote a more inclusive society for people with disabilities. The HWSETA does this by:

- Increasing awareness of the challenges faced by people with disabilities.
- Involving people with disabilities. This will ensure that their voices are heard and that their needs are taken into consideration.
- Providing access to education and training. The HWSETA has specific goals to support people with disabilities across all of our programmes.
- Collaborating with disability organisations. This
  has assisted the HWSETA to ensure participation
  in our programmes and understanding on how we
  can improve in regards disability inclusivity. We
  use these partners to identify the needs of people
  with disabilities.

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### Portia's Passion to Benefit Wheelchair Users

HWSETA proudly funded Portia Refilwe Mavhungu, an entrepreneur who was introduced to the HWSETA through Play your Part, Ignite, where the CEO of HWSETA was invited to be a judge. This initiative, that was established to support TVET colleges, youth unemployment and SMMEs across various sectors, offered an opportunity for TVET college students to take a masterclass and then promote their SME business.

The HWSETA was elected to mentor Portia over a short period. The product that Portia designed was innovative and related to the health sector. In response to its mandate to support youth, women, unemployed and SMMEs, the HWSETA in its planning for the year, awarded a R500 000 Small and Micro Enterprises (SME) funding to PRD Logical Solutions (Pty) Ltd, represented by Portia.

The funding includes R413 000 for Cranium Medical Products (Pty) Ltd to prototype and manufacture a wheelchair device for sanitary care, and R87 000 for an American patent on such a wheelchair device, the Para-Tube.

Portia invited the HWSETA CEO, Executive Manager for skills development and the relevant staff members to visit the Cranium Medical Products (Pty) Ltd manufacturing facility in November 2022, to observe the facilities, and to discuss the status of the prototype and manufacture of the first devices.

Portia is a passionate, intelligent young woman, and through her resilience and perseverance has made it to this point without giving up. She started this journey over ten years ago, and she finally has a prototype product that is set to assist many persons in wheelchairs make their lives better.

- My interests are in furthering my education with a particular interest in animal nutrition and innovative advances in animal health care.






















A No, I did not.

To my fellow graduates, I wish you a brighter future ahead. We have come this far but this is the beginning. All the best for the future.


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

















A Yes, financially we got paid in lump sum which is difficult.

- How many years did it take for you to complete?
- A It took me four years to complete the qualification.
- Is it something you are passionate about?
- I am very passionate about it, helping people to help themselves and better versions of themselves is what I live for. I am mostly drawn to working with children of any age and I have been fortunate to do that at my current employment. I work at a school with children between the ages of 14 and 19.
- After completing your qualification, were you offered employment, if so how do you feel about such a life changing offer despite the country's high unemployment rate?
- The HWSETA through the service of Mrs Phumla Rasmeni employed me through their learnership programme. I was placed at Masithethe Counselling Services and we were working with schools. Masithethe then placed me at Baysville School of Skills on a temporary basis. Baysville noticed the passion I have for my work and offered me employment on contract. I have been with them since 2020 and they have been renewing my contract on a yearly basis. I feel blessed to have this chance because now I am able to do what I am passionate about.

## Raising Awareness for Disability Rights





November is Disability Rights
Awareness Month and to mark the importance of raising awareness for people with disabilities,
HWSETA spoke to Vuyelwa Mpumza, a Projects Officer in the Skills Development Planning division who has Post-polio syndrome (PPS).

PPS is a condition that causes gradual muscle weakness and muscle atrophy (loss) that can affect people who've had polio. Vuyelwa was diagnosed with the disease at a very young nine months of age.

 How do you feel being part of an organisation (HWSETA) that is inclusive?

I am happy to be part of the HWSETA family. The organisation has accepted and supported me, and also demonstrated a great deal of belief in me.

 Have you faced difficulties in the community or in your workspace and how have you overcome these difficulties?

I only experienced challenges when I was younger when my peers exhibited discriminatory behaviour due to not understanding the disability. I always had to fight to be part of every game that we were playing as children and fit in even if it means I have to be just there as speaker or judge if the game needed more of physically fit person. As I have matured, I have never truly experienced challenges in the workplaces and community. I believe this is because I have always accepted myself and have never opened that platform for one to think there's something wrong with me.

I am a very confident person who does not see the disability as an obstacle to achieve whatever I wish to achieve in life.

How does being seen as 'different' impact you?

Let me start with saying that no-one really has the right to classify me as 'different'. And whilst there are some people who may choose to see me as different – I don't! I am an ordinary person that has a physically challenging condition. I am very confident and do not see disability as an obstacle to achieve anything I want to achieve in life. I refuse to be looked down upon.

 What plans do you have for yourself in terms of your career?

I am currently studying Human and Social studies and hoping to complete soon. I see myself as future social activist, particularly for women and children who are victims of Gender Based Violence daily.

What words of encouragement do you have for people living with disabilities?

The best gift that God has ever given you is life and in your mind can do anything; nothing will stop you into becoming what you want. The other most important thing is to accept yourself as you are, don't let the disability make you feel less of a person.

The main aim of these sessions was to engage with our stakeholders for our 2023 – 24 Strategic Plan update and to share key research findings relevant to the Health and Welfare sector. Mr Sikhumbuzo Gcabashe from the HWSETA, presented key areas of programme funding.

In our continued effort to address the skills shortages in the health and social development sector, as well as to develop a capable and skilled workforce, this type of engagement allows us to gain insight into strategic research, and gives us the opportunity to address our sector needs and place key focus on occupations that will fill in the skills gaps.

## WSP-ATR Submissions Due at End of April

It is that time of the year again where HWSETA employers submit their annual Workplace Skills Plan (WSP) and Annual Training Reports (ATR). Not only does the submission of a WSP and ATR qualify skills development levy contributors to claim mandatory grant funding, it also means that these employers can apply for discretionary grant funding. In addition, employers that submit these documents may claim skills development points on their

Important Information You Need to Know about 2023 WSP and ATR Submissions

- The deadline for WSP and ATR submission is 30 April 2023.
- The due date for application for extensions is 15 March 2023.
- Employers that apply for an extension are required to attach a formal letter to the WSP extension submission application form, detailing justifiable reasons for an extension. This letter must signed by the SDF and Senior Management team member of the organisation.
- The maximum period for an extension is one month – thereby making the due date the 31 May 2020

Protect yourself from unscrupulous operators that are not accredited with HWSETA by doing your research before enrolling in any course that is being offered. We strongly advise that you ensure you do your due diligence to avoid being defrauded by unaccredited operators.

## HWSETA ACCREDITATION CHECKLIST FOR LEARNERS



Unscrupulous operators that are not accredited with HWSETA and/or offer courses that are not accredited are a massive issue in South Africa and result in many people being defrauded of their hard earned money.





#### IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY

To check that a training provider is accredited Visit http://www.hwseta.org.za/resources/learner-resources/ to download the list of HWSETA accredited training providers or call the HWSETA Toll Free Helpline on 0800 864 478.



The accredited training provider and course must be registered with the HWSETA Unaccredited training providers and course will result in a qualification that is not recognised, meaning you will not have a valid qualification when applying for a job.



#### HOW DO YOU DIFFERENTIATE FAKE FROM REAL? Ask the provider for proof of their

registration/accreditation.
But that's not enough, you must check the expiry date, Hwseta accreditation must be renewed every 5 years. The certificate must list which qualifications or programs they are accredited for.
