The Health and Welfare Sector Education and Training Authority (HWSETA) has launched an innovative initiative designed to transform the educational landscape for rural learners across South Africa. The Siyakhulisa programme represents a strategic investment in identifying and nurturing exceptional students who demonstrate outstanding performance in pure Mathematics and Life Sciences or Physical Sciences, with the ultimate goal of creating a pipeline of skilled professionals for the health and welfare sector.

At its core, the programme recognises that rural learners often face unique challenges in accessing quality education and career guidance, despite possessing tremendous potential. The Siyakhulisa initiative addresses these disparities by providing comprehensive support that extends far beyond traditional academic assistance. Selected learners receive dedicated mentoring from industry experts who understand the demands and opportunities within the health and welfare sector. This mentorship serves as a crucial bridge, offering students the guidance and support they need to maintain their academic excellence throughout their high school journey and successfully transition into tertiary education.

The programme's comprehensive approach encompasses multiple dimensions of student support. HWSETA has established strategic partnerships with schools and tutors who offer Saturday school programmes, ensuring that participating learners receive additional academic reinforcement to maintain their high standards in Mathematics and Science. Recognising that academic pressure can significantly impact student performance, the programme also incorporates psychological support services. Through collaborations with qualified psychologists from HWSETA's cooperative network, learners receive professional assistance to manage exam-related anxiety and stress, ensuring their mental wellbeing remains a priority throughout their educational journey.

Career guidance forms another cornerstone of the Siyakhulisa programme. HWSETA facilitates partnerships with universities to provide learners with opportunities to attend open days and career exhibitions. These experiences are invaluable in helping students make informed decisions about their future career paths, exposing them to the diverse opportunities available within the health and welfare sector and enabling them to align their academic pursuits with their professional aspirations.

Since its launch in 2023, the programme has already demonstrated remarkable success in achieving its objectives. HWSETA has awarded bursaries to 15 Siyakhulisa mentees, representing a significant investment in the future of the health and welfare sector. The programme's annual camp brings together ninety learners from across all nine provinces of South Africa, creating a national network of high-achieving students who can support and inspire one another.

The diversity of career paths chosen by the bursary recipients reflects the programme's success in exposing learners to countless opportunities within the sector. From the Eastern Cape, Yonda Bonani has enrolled at the Tertiary Agricultural Research and Development Institute (TARDI) to pursue an Animal Health Technician qualification, while Yamkela Mboma has chosen to study



Bachelor of Audiology at the University of the Witwatersrand. Sandi Gonela has embarked on a Bachelor of Nursing degree at Nelson Mandela University, and Kwanele Mbangula has also selected the Animal Health Technician qualification at TARDI.

The programme's reach extends to learners from North West University, where Anem Betana is pursuing an Extended BSc in Biological Sciences with specialisations in Microbiology and Biochemistry. From the Northern Cape, Kamogelo Poe has enrolled for a Bachelor of Consumer Sciences in Genetics and Zoology at the University of the Free State. The medical field has attracted several students, including TC Ivandro Markgraaf, who is studying Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery at the University of the Free State, and Nkululeko Scotha, who is pursuing the same qualification at Sefako Makgatho University.

The programme's impact is further evident in the variety of specialisations chosen by recipients. Tebogo Kgatlhane is studying BSc Biological Sciences at Sol Plaatjie University, while Lebelonyana Dimakatso from the Free State has chosen a Bachelor of Science with specialisation in Zoology and Life Sciences at the University of the Free State. The allied health professions are represented by Mosela Kumako, who is pursuing a Bachelor of Radiography in Diagnostics at Sefako Makgatho University, and Andiswa Canham from KwaZulu-Natal, who has enrolled for a Bachelor of Dental Science at the University of the Western Cape.

The Siyakhulisa programme represents more than just financial support for deserving students; it embodies HWSETA's commitment to addressing the critical skills shortages in the health and welfare sector while simultaneously promoting equity and access to quality education. By investing in rural learners who demonstrate exceptional potential, the programme is creating a sustainable model for sector development that recognises and nurtures talent regardless of geographical or socioeconomic circumstances.

As the programme continues to evolve and expand, it serves as a beacon of hope for rural communities across South Africa, demonstrating that with the right support systems in place, geographical barriers need not limit educational and career aspirations.

Invitation to Participate in Mandela Day Commemoration Exhibition - 30 July 2025



Celebrating New Horizons in Healthcare: HWSETA Funds 94 Phlebotomy Technicians

The healthcare sector in South Africa received a significant boost on June 6, 2025, as the HWSETA proudly celebrated the graduation of 140 dedicated individuals in phlebotomy and medical technology. This momentous occasion, held at Luwende Woord in Centurion, marked the culmination of intensive learnerships designed to address critical skills shortages in the country.

Of the 140 graduands, 94 were funded by the HWSETA. They successfully completed the Phlebotomy Technician Learnership, a programme facilitated by Themba Futhi Ukhule Innovators and Ampath. The remaining graduates emerged from the Medical Technology Learnership, conducted by AMPATH. These programmes are vital for the healthcare ecosystem.

Phlebotomy technicians are skilled professionals responsible for the precise art of drawing blood samples for crucial analysis and diagnosis, forming the very first step in many medical investigations. Medical technicians, on the other hand, are the backbone of modern diagnostics, expertly utilising diverse technologies from low-risk devices to complex high-risk equipment to identify diseases, understand their causes, and ultimately contribute to improved patient health and well-being.

The graduation ceremony was attended by Dr. Ebrahim Hoosien, CEO of AMPATH, who delivered an inspiring address emphasising the indispensable role of passion in the medical field. He highlighted that phlebotomy technicians and medical technicians are not just technical experts but compassionate individuals who play a salient role in patients' lives. Echoing this sentiment, Mr. Sikhumbuzo Gacbashe of the HWSETA underscored the immense importance of both learnership programs, not only for the industry but for South Africa as a whole, as they directly contribute to filling essential skills gaps.

A truly moving moment of the ceremony saw the graduands recite "The Modern Hippocratic Oath," a powerful testament to their commitment to ethical practice and patient care. Loved ones and friends shared in the joyous celebration of these significant achievements.

These transformative learnerships, which first commenced in January 2013, offer more than just qualifications; they provide life-changing opportunities for permanent employment. The two-year programs are meticulously structured to include comprehensive training in medical laboratories, blending both invaluable workplace experience with rigorous classroom learning.

The success of these initiatives is evident in the remarkable absorption rates. An impressive 100% of the phlebotomy technicians and medical technology graduates who completed the AMPATH program have been absorbed into the organisation. Furthermore, 40% of the graduands from the Themba Futhi Ukhule Innovators learnership program have already secured appointments in various other companies, demonstrating the high demand for their newly acquired skills.

The HWSETA remains committed to fostering talent and building a robust healthcare workforce in South Africa, and these graduations are a shining example of that commitment in action.








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HWSETA Beneficiary Secures Permanent Employment After Internship

Health and Welfare Sector Education and Training Authority (HWSETA) and National Associaation of Child Care Workers Launch Internship Programme for 217 Child and Youth Care Workers

In a significant step toward addressing unemployment among qualified Child and Youth Care Workers (CYCWs), the Health and Welfare Sector Education and Training Authority (HWSETA), in partnership with the National Association of Child Care Workers (NACCW), has launched an internship programme benefiting 217 unemployed graduates.

This initiative was born out of the urgent need to create employment pathways for qualified CYCWs, especially those holding diplomas and Level 4 Auxiliary CYCW qualifications. The grant agreement for the programme was signed in November 2023, with immediate implementation thereafter. The internship spans a 12-month period and is scheduled to conclude in March 2026.

Focus on Rural Development and Skills Enhancement

All participants in the programme come from rural communities across KwaZulu-Natal, Free State, Gauteng, Mpumalanga, and North West provinces. The initiative brings much-needed financial support into underserved regions while contributing meaningfully to the development of the CYCW sector.

The programme has also successfully secured donor funding to supplement stipends, thereby enhancing financial support for interns and making the roles more sustainable.

Structured Learning and Diverse Placement Opportunities

The internship is carefully structured to broaden the scope of professional practice and hands-on experience across the CYCW spectrum.

Le Child Protection - in collaboration with Childline



Research and Academic Administration - with Durban University of Technology (DUT)

Supervision Roles - for degreed CYCWs



Residential Care Work - with Child Care Centres



PEIP Programmes - focused on community and family-based interventions



Youth Work - via NACCW Youth Forums



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INSPIRING FUTURE HEALTHCARE PROFESSIONALS: HWSETA'S CAREER GUIDANCE INITIATIVE AT SCI-BONO DISCOVERY CENTRE



The series then expanded its scope to explore the veterinary sciences sector through a comprehensive visit to Tardi Agricultural Rural Development School. This particular episode proved especially valuable as it revealed the multifaceted nature of animal health careers, showcasing three distinct roles that demonstrate the breadth of opportunities available within this field.

The Tholakele Centre of Hope provides a crucial service to the community, offering shelter and care to 40 children whose ages span from 3 to 18 years old. HWSETA's contribution went beyond volunteer hours, as the organization made a substantial donation valued at R50,000, which included two months' worth of groceries and a new stove. This contribution will provide essential nutritional support and cooking facilities that will benefit the children for weeks to come.

The reach of HWSETA's impact extended beyond the immediate beneficiaries at the centre. The team prepared and served meals for 100 people, including centre staff and representatives from other organizations who joined the Mandela Day activities.



This communal approach to service created a spirit of collaboration and shared purpose that amplifies the impact of individual efforts.

Particularly noteworthy is the connection between HWSETA's core mission and the centre's operations. The Tholakele Centre of Hope employs four Child and Youth Care Worker bursary recipients who have benefited from HWSETA's skills development programs.
